# Stella Hyman, Our Branch's Fiercest Advocate for Women

Those who know Stella Hyman well, will not be surprised that when she was asked for permission to become a subject for this Advance article, her response was, "Absolutely not! I'm simply not that interesting." That humble response was no surprise. However, to give thanks to a woman who has been

more than generous with her energy, time, enthusiasm and talent dedicated to the GWA Branch of the AAUW for the last 30 years, this article comes as a tribute to her because she is a very interesting woman!

Stella's early and remarkable beginnings started in Poland before WWII. Her family provided the means for her and some family members to escape the clutches of the Nazi's anti-semitic coralling of all Jews. Stella was only six or seven years old at the time and she doesn't remember all the details. Her family's escape did not come via the Atlantic, but the northern route via the Siberian railroad that took all of them to safety in Japan. After a brief stay in Japan, the family made connections with other aunts and uncles in New York City where Stella came to grow up. This arduous journey of many miles, through many cultures must have had a lasting impact on the fortitude and the resilience that Stella exhibits. When questioned, her response was 'that it was just something we had to do, so we didn't think about it - we just did it.'

Education was a priority for her family and that continues to influence Stella's actions to this day. Stella's initial desire was to study art and her home demonstrates that love in the different artifacts she has collected from world travels. However, she calculated (which Stella does often and very well) that she could make more money in the sciences. She was educated in New York at

Syracuse for a BS in Physics, at Columbia for an MA in Physics and at NYU for an MS in Mathematics. While achieving these educational milestones, she married and started a family, a daughter named Michelle. Stella's first career was as an electrical engineer for ITT. After a long and successful career as a mathematics professor at William Paterson University, Stella retired.

Retirement is not a word that can be associated with Stella. Besides being a very active member of the League of Women Voters, Stella has served the GWA Branch wearing so many hats! Both organizations fed Stella's passion to give women a voice! Whether it was through representation at the ballot box or fostering a path for women through education, Stella was fierce!

Stella was an energetic part of the branch's early history of fundraising for scholarships. She was always an interesting contributor to the Lit Group, and for years held the roundtable discussion in deciding which books would be selected for the upcoming year. Again, in an effort to give opportunity to young girls in the field of math and science, her passion, she was an interviewer for selecting promising young teens to participate in AAUW's successful camp program, Tech Trek at Georgian Court University. To continue her promotion for young women in the field of math and sciences, Stella assisted AAUW organizers for Teen Tech, a program for high school girls at Montclair University.

But what Stella will most be revered for is her tenacity and accuracy in keeping the books as Treasurer for the branch for nearly two decades. A smile comes to most members as they recall a call from Stella as a friendly reminder to "pay up" for dues or dinners.

Besides this swarm of activity and commitment, she made time for vigilant exercise at Spa 23 and in her own home gym. She also was an avid gardener and often called members to meet her for lunch with

interesting conversation as dessert.

Unfortunately, Stella's energy and vitality is waning and she has resigned as Treasurer for our Branch. Her service will be sorely missed, but her friendship is still available to all of us. This woman never dwelt in the past and those details to most are unknown. A bit troubled by her future, something she never dwelled upon either, but those who know Stella are

confident that she will make a difference no matter where she resides. This is one INTERESTING WOMAN!

## CURRENT EVENTS

One of the many committees that our organization hosts is the Current Events Committee which meets monthly to share discussions around topics that are of interest to our members. The topics are chosen by majority vote and usually involve current issues or matters that are relevant to us at the time.

Responding to the racial unrest last summer, the topics revolved around race: slavery, and the many historical and political involvements of our government involving voting rights, etc. Other topics were China and the issues of Hong Kong, falun gong and biography of Madame Chiang Kai-shek and other political figures.

At our December meeting the topic was Climate, a very broad subject. Reports were given about The Green New Deal, fires, especially in National Parks, fracking, pipelines, the dangers of Permafrost and the value of trees to counter negative climate change.

The subject of the January meeting will be Russia

and the topics so far submitted are: biography of Putin; How Russia is winning the climate challenge; the Ukraine; and Russian "mischief: hackers and assassins".

The optimum size of our group is from 6 to 8 members so that speakers might cover their subject with some depth. However, the size of the group could exceed that number and regroup into two, covering the same topic, or another topic altogether.

When the weather and health issues permit, we could have our meetings outdoors as we have done in the past, or continue with our Zoom meetings. The next meeting is on January 22, 2021 at 1pm, but going forward the committee will meet on the third Friday of the month at the same time.

Following is John's description of the tour. Doesn't it sound interesting!!

It's partly what you don't see in the other seasons: bones of trees, bird's nests, berries etc. I'll talk a little about the newly placed sculptures. We can peek into the greenhouses. We will find one shrub variety blooming.

The ponds are being dredged. This is a first time event. The tour should take about forty five minutes. Degree of difficulty: all level surfaces except for one incline. It doesn't make any sense to do this if there is snow on ground: if this is the case, we will reschedule for February 11 or 18.

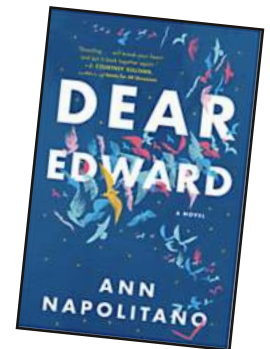
