Abby, who lives in the Ridge Rise community in Wayne couldn't help but notice the avid walker who regularly



When Stella picked her up, in the car was another woman from the neighborhood who was unbeknown to Abby; her name was Aviva Sanders. By the end of the meeting and hence the evening, Abby knew that this organization of bright, fascinating and social women promoting the cause for the advancement of women was a new opportunity to grow intellectually, meet new and like-minded women who supported a cause that was close to her heart. And, incidentally, she established a new, lasting friendship with Aviva.

Abby continued to spread the good news about our branch and was responsible for bringing warm, talented and life-long friend, Peggy Gardner to our branch, as well as the capable and worldly Merrill Crowell to our group.

Abby definitely personifies the law of attraction! Abby is not intimidated to make good decisions for herself.

Professionally a Speech/Language Therapist, she has worked at many private schools in Upper Montclair, Totowa and Wayne. Her compassion for children and her desire for them to succeed is evidenced in a learning technique she used. Since many of her students were language deficient, she gave them disposable cameras and instructed them to take pictures of their pets, bed, favorite meal, etc. After posting their pictures she gave them the opportunity to share stories about the pictures they took. This was met with great success in breaking the trust barrier in a group.

In her second marriage to Paul,



she has enjoyed extensive travel to China, Japan and many European countries. She tells of one story in Rome where upon arrival she found herself very ill and needing to find a local doctor. The hotel arranged for a young, attractive doctor who only spoke Italian. Unable to communicate her 101F temp to the doctor who only knew Celsius was comical and tragic. Abby went to a local hospital, alone and language-isolated while Paul tried to enjoy Rome on his own. The irony, the medication she received kicked in when they were departing. On the plane, in first-class, a perk by Paul because of her missed opportunity, Abby's appetite returned and she enjoyed the food, the wine and the flight! However, Paul kept his promise to return to Rome for another travel opportunity!

Abby's dedication to volunteer service is not limited to the AAUW. She, along with Peggy Gardner, were members of the Women's American ORT (Organization for Rehabilitation through Training); she shopped for those who couldn't through the Passaic County Home Care Options and is active in the Jewish Federation of Northern N.J. which delivers Kosher meals to those in need. Since her back surgery she has given this task to Paul to "keep him busy". She also was an Uber Driver for a year when she got her electric

car, "an opportunity to enjoy riding it".

Needless to say, Abby Schwartz, mother of two and grandmother of five, is another busy, interesting, delightful woman who attracts and graces the GWA Branch!

GWA Member Arlene Sullivan Receives Congressional Recognition



Morris Catholic High School Visual and Graphic Arts teacher, Arlene Sullivan, received Congressional recognition from Congresswoman, Mikie Sherrill for her work in 3D printing parts for over 13.000 face shields for healthcare workers in hospitals, nursing homes and homeless shelters that were donated at the height of need throughout New Jersey. "This is a great honor not only for me but

the entire Morris Catholic community who jumped right in and raised \$7000 to support the supply costs. It shows who we are as a school", says Sullivan

March 2019, the very beginning of the pandemic, when all teaching went virtual literally overnight, Arlene jumped right in and began using her skills to print 3D PRUSA 3 parts for healthcare worker's protective safety shields. Sullivan heeded a call from Picatinny Arsenal, which had hosted a 3D printing workshop for art teachers several years prior, asking local teachers to join together in a grassroots effort to print 3D parts. Initially, teachers from four area schools joined in but it soon grew to over 58 people, printing, assembling and distributing over 10,000 masks to healthcare workers in local hospitals and nursing homes throughout the state. Thor Labs purchased and donated clear shield material to the cause, which brought in Mark Maruska, Gravity Designworks in Newton, who used his company's resources to laser cut the plastic shields that attached to the parts to complete each face shield.

When the group shut down in May of 2020, saying they felt the need was filled, it caught some participants off guard, particularly Sullivan whose school raised an amazing \$7,000 for the cause. Sullivan felt there was still a continuing need, especially for nursing homes and homeless shelters, so she contacted others in the group who agreed and they continued printing. Together, members of the Vernon HS Robotics team, Mark Maruska and Sullivan continued printing, assembling and distributing over 3,000 additional protective face shields to local nursing homes and homeless shelters, until the material for the shields ran out. A discussion took place and it became apparent that it was more cost effective to purchase comparable quality shields than to print them and to that end the remainder of the funds purchased an additional 600 masks, all of which have been donated. "It's amazing what people working toward a common goal can accomplish", said Sullivan. "I am proud to have been a part of this overwhelming effort".

And GWA is proud of Arlene!

~ Technology Simplified ~

This year, the cost of cybercrime has soared to \$6 trillion worldwide. Crooks are way ahead of us, able to guess our passwords based on clues we leave

behind. Once the criminal cracks the formula, and sign in as you, they can take over your account, because you've made it very, very easy for them to use your information across multiple social-media accounts, bank accounts and e-commerce sites. Using their own ingenuity and

automated programs that target thousands of computers simultaneously, hackers can quickly crack many simple passwords and break into online accounts. And once they sign in as you, they have access.

The internet can be navigated relatively safely. To keep your information safe and your financial accounts protected, security comes down to a few basic boxes to tick, with strong passwords topping the list.

We know we should take those hated passwords seriously, but most of us do them wrong, like reuse them or choose obvious terms like a pet's or child's name. What makes a good password?

■ The first step towards making a more secure password is to increase its length, perhaps to a sentence. The more characters that a password has, the more characters a hacker has to guess before they can break it. According to today's standards, passwords should be at least 12 letters long and a combination of both upper and lower case letters, numbers and symbols (!,@,#,\$,%, &).

■ To help keep your data secure, use a different password for every website and service. Don't use the same root password, like your grandson's name by merely adding numbers or symbols, and use passwords that are strong and difficult to guess. Now, how to remember all of your passwords?

Write them down and put the paper in a safe place. Of course, this is not ideal.



■ Your iPhone will save your passwords (always back up to the Cloud), as will your Android phones via the Google app, but you might lose your phone.

Password savers are built into the browsers from Apple, Google, and Firefox.

Or, as I do, use an easy-to-use password manager. There are several free and lowcost password managers (between \$15-25/year and free versions with scaled-down services) like

OnePassword, Dashlane, Keeper and LastPass.

Password managers are not hard to use, and you will only have to remember one great password, or 'password sentence' like ILove2\$wimInThe0cean92!. If you create an account that requires a password, the managers also offer to create a unique password — a long, computer-generated combination of numbers, characters and upper and lowercase letters — for each site. This removes risks associated with reusing passwords. And you're done. Each password is encrypted and saved.

An AARP-sponsored report examined identity fraud and found more than 1 in 4 Americans were hit by identity fraud last year, when losses were almost \$17 billion. Identity fraud is worse than identity theft, which is when your personally identifiable information (PII) is stolen or compromised, as in a data breach. In identity fraud cases, a crook capitalizes on that sensitive data and rips you off or commits a related offense.

What to do? Creating an action plan to keep safe, and stronger passwords are a good start. It's risky for a consumer to use an identical sign-on name coupled with the same, weak password — But whatever you do, do something. Hacking isn't going away. The risks are growing daily. Just like everybody should be wearing a seat belt, everybody should be using a password manager.
