Rather than focus on one particular woman, this article will celebrate all our members; especially those who have shared reflections on a time in their life when they have contributed to improve the lives of others and its rewards.

**Elaine Dolsky** ~ ""Thinking of my years as an educator, I supported my elementary-aged students and their families; whether it was a smile, a hug, words of encouragement or providing resources to support their growth, I was able to contribute to their well-being."

Nancy Ferer ~ "I have devoted a great amount of time over the past two years to a childless woman who became widowed after a very close and very long marriage. I phoned her every day for a year and even now talk to her every other day... also I try to meet with her as often as possible. I hope my efforts have been helpful to her."

**Peggy Gardner** ~ It's hard to think of what I might have contributed to the world. I was a designer at Scholastic, Inc. for 26 years and, before my children, I taught elementary school art for 4 years. However, I know I have made a difference with my family. I have been there for my husband through some very difficult times...I have my mother to thank since I saw how she supported my father through years of emotional disorders...I have my grandparents to thank for their unconditional love and as a result, I think I've made a difference with my children. I've listened to them and respected their opinions since they were just people in little clothes. I have always tried to be their cheerleader, being non-judgemental and letting them make their own choices. Now, being a Grandma puts me in a special category. I just love my grands with all my heart and they know it. We always have a good time together with no stress, no 'have to's'...Only time will tell if I have made a difference for my grandkids, but I would be so happy to know that I have paid it forward!"

**Bea Kettlewood** ~ "I have belonged to the First Reformed Church of Pompton Plains since Baptism 92 years ago last October. I did a variety of things over the years, but the most helpful to others and educational was being a member of the Mission Team for 30 years. We have helped people in Africa, Haiti, Guatemala, Kentucky as well as Newark and Paterson. I participated in a trip to aid the needy in Kentucky and many trips to Newark."

**Lorraine LaShell** ~ "Aside from raising and providing a life model for my offspring...I was a marketing services consultant...having the opportunity to mentor a young woman starting out in her career. She was from another state with no family nearby. We developed a friendship that continues to this day and she credits me with her success.

For several years I have been involved in raising funds for and being part of the selection process of selecting women for our scholarships. It is the core of what our branch is about and I'm happy to be part of this effort...The money we provide, however small, does make a difference!"

Ada Liggett ~ "It made perfect sense to me when Donna (Persh) and I took on the job of AAUW Cheerio Persons. That's what I enjoy doing - sending good cheer for whatever occasion. I have been Hallmark's best customer and I use e-cards. I also fostered a book group in our community and kept it going for years, only recently handing over the reins to a younger member. Through the years I've participated in church fundraisers, food drives, etc. As a kid I never volunteered to be the leader. I wanted to be the mommy! I'm consistent!"

**Joan London** ~ "Several years ago, a friend broke both wrists playing tennis. I could only imagine the things she was unable to do for herself. I decided to cook for her. I made a month's worth of meals, individually packaged, labeled with directions. Her husband was able to easily put dinner on the table with little or no effort. This took a huge burden off her and her husband. To this day, she talks about the wonderful way they 'dined."

*Linda Nardone* ~ "I am proud of my academic research and pharmaceutical drug development career...that has led to saving lives and advances in drug treatments. My first experience was at Yale, School of Medicine which involved research on premature infant mortality due to Respiratory Distress Syndrome...The research provided for the development of a pharmaceutical agent used widely today and protocols for treating the mother during the premature delivery. I am told that the two initiatives have contributed to having an average of 30,000 babies a year over 50 years. Whether that is 1.5 million babies or not, I am sure that because of the drug and the protocol used in 2007 on my grandson who was a very, very tiny 2 1/2 month preemie, lived—and that feels good to me!"


**Diane Ricart** ~ "I was very fortunate to have three different careers-the fashion industry, the urban youth ministry and elementary education. The one that really reached deep down inside me and touched my inner being was running an urban youth ministry called Youth Guidance in Paterson. I went back to graduate school to prepare myself for that 'calling' and put everything I had inside me to help, care for, inspire and love the girls I worked with. I got their names from the juvenile court. I then visited their homes and invited the girls to join me each week–and they did! Sister, cousins, and friends asked if they could come, too. The van was full and so was my heart. I trained the volunteers to work with me, hired a staff, raised the funds for the ministry by speaking at dinners, churches and women's groups. What I learned was that when you reach out to help and care for others, you are blessed in so many ways."

Janice Rutherford ~ "Since my retirement I have been a volunteer for a program called Senior Cents. The volunteers assist elderly or disabled individuals with organizing paperwork, making sure bills are paid and occasionally food shopping if they are unable to shop. Most of the clients live alone and sometimes their tasks are overwhelming. It has been a rewarding experience for me and the clients are very appreciative."

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Over our Branch's history the members have sold wares, books, participated in walk-a-thons, etc. to raise money for scholarships. The awards were granted to women who were financially limited and non-traditional students. They have attended our dinners and told their stories which touched our hearts. There's no doubt that we have made history! Winston Churchill once said, We make a living by what we get. We make a life by what we give." The GWA women indeed have rich lives since they experience the joy of giving and making a difference in all the lives that are better and richer by their efforts!


# LUNCH BUNCH


