sandpipers, hummingbirds, nightingales, homing pigeons, etc.; however, no matter how far they roam, they return to the nest of the Greater Wayne Branch. One such bird who still returns despite living in Mt. Pleasant, SC is Ann Raynor, an active and revered member of the branch since 1988. Ann, like many members, are drawn to AAUW to share interests and a desire to give deserving women opportunities to further their education through scholarship.

Springing into Spring...or Ways to be More Environmentally Friendly

As a active member of environmental groups since 2006, I am always looking at ways to be more environmentally friendly. With spring in the air and pandemic pressure easing, I decided to turn my efforts to the outdoors. First I thought about the possibility of composting. Whether you live in a home with a garden or simply in an apartment, the goal is to reduce the amount of waste that would normally go into a landfill. So I bought myself a small compost container and started to compost things like coffee grinds eggshells and vegetative waste. I'm adding that to my outdoor beds as well as my potted plants. It's my first attempt at composting and it's a lot easier than I thought. I did read about adding worms to the compost but I'll put that on the back burner for now. We'll see how the wormless version goes. But in the meantime, it's just another small step in doing something positive for our environment.

With that under my belt, I was on a mission to control the chemical products that actually went into our lawn with efforts to go as organic as possible. I recently contracted an eco-friendly lawn company and my organic problem was resolved despite what I thought would be my biggest obstacle—my husband's approval—and yes, organic won! If you don't have a lawn, that's even better so you can think on a smaller and less expensive scale. Add a few more plants to the interior of your home and reduce the amount of chemicals you use to support them and you'll find that plants can help purify the air, create positive vibes and amplify your sense of well being.

With two victories in hand, I'm now on a quest to change the gas powered leaf blowers that are used around our property to electric. There are countless articles about gas leaf blowers and their impact on the environment let alone the serenity of the neighborhood. On a recent trip to Washington DC, I learned that gas leaf blowers there are banned completely. And even if you don't have a lawn or leaves in your flower beds you are still subjected to the pollution and noise level for those who use them around you. So why stop there? As more municipalities are working to ban gas leaf blowers, why not take some action like writing a letter to support leaf blower electrification. I decided to do that. Boy I'll be glad when spring is over. I'm exhausted.

MORE GOOD TIPS FROM BARBARA

While I'm new to composting, eggshells are high in calcium which is beneficial to the soil and coffee grinds are especially good for acid loving plants. I have been planting the compost around my plants and also added some into my pansy planters that are on my patio. They're still alive and so far all are doing well. I haven't added anything but discarded vegetable matter which I cut up in small pieces to the mix. All small steps are a means of sequestering carbon and keeping methane (26x more powerful than Co2) out of the atmosphere. I also store vegetable peelings and parts that are beneficial to making broth in the freezer and that works very well.



This is the compost container I purchased. I keep it right by my sink and it's lid is tight and keeps contents odor free. Since content is relatively small, I plant it throughout my yard about every 5 days.




