### In One Woman's Opinion...by Dorothy Quinn

I have often thought that today's millennial women are so fortunate since they enjoy advantages and a plethora of choices that were not possible for us Baby Boomers. They have career opportunities far more diverse than we could have imagined; they have many equal opportunity employment rights that we have fought long and hard for, and they have options to combine career and family responsibilities seamlessly. Or, so it seemed to me.

I had the pleasure of lunching with a few 30-somethings and they were very perplexed about the career-family role that many of them were facing. Most are in long-term relationships and unsure about how they will navigate the next ten years. They plan to marry and have a family and also feel the pressure of the biological clock to fulfill the dreams that they and their mates have for a family; not to mention the pressure from their parents to fulfill their dream of grandparenting.

These women feel they are at a crossroad. Many of them enjoy fulfilling careers that are demanding and include travel. It's been very satisfying for these young single women. However, with the prospect of marriage, many feel they would need to give this up to take on a more domestic role that marriage and family would deem necessary. A solution they discussed would be to change careers, a change that might require further education or a masters. This option poses a roadblock since most are still saddled with student loans and/or are not willing to take on debt to pay for that education, especially in light of purchasing a home to raise a family securely. I was also surprised that this forwardthinking group of young women who have started retirement funds are now including the financial responsibility of starting a 529 for their children as well.

When asked about the prospect of finding another career within their realm of training and education,

some of them said that the salary for a less demanding career would not be a choice since it would most likely entail a salary cut. Even the same position with another firm or entity would set them back to an entry level salary. Most felt that they



could not accept that consequence since their present salary would be needed to cover the cost of childcare. Surprisingly none of them deferred their dilemma to theirpartners.

They all expressed the desire to feed their domestic female yearning. They admire the lifestyles of mothers or grandmothers who took pride in child rearing, gardening, and baking. I was somewhat shocked to hear these terribly modern women expressing the need to develop these traits of womanhood, but perhaps the hunter-gatherer syndrome that lies deeply embedded in all our genes has not disappeared.

With all of the hurdles that generations of women have overcome, I do not doubt that these bright women will solve these conundrums and continue the fight. Their dilemma, albeit much different from ours, comes down to the same question. How does a woman fulfill personal satisfaction and maintain the biological role of womanhood? If men only gave birth there would be no such fight. The government would give them choice over their own body; employers would provide equal pay for equal work, and maternity/sick leave, universal childcare and healthcare would be a given. Let's face it, we continue to carry the burden. I'm not so sure Atlas was male since she carries the weight of the world on her shoulders!

# IMPROVING OUR HEALTH THROUGH BIRDS IN THE NEW YEAR

Growing up in Jersey City the

only bird I can remember as a child was a sparrow. Then a number of years ago after cataract surgery and retirement, I decided to take a closer look at the "sparrows" that I now had the vision and time to observe in my suburban environment. I began by taking photos of birds in my yard, going on field trips with local Audubon groups and continued photographing wherever I traveled so that I could determine what species I was observing. With the addition of a bird feeder and birdbath in my yard and equipped with the Merlin App on my phone, I was thrilled to be able to identify over 20 bird species in my yard and over 200 species worldwide and gradually add them to my photo collection.

With the decline of birds throughout the world due to habitat loss, the increased use of herbicides and pesticides, and climate change along with over 2 billion worldwide killed by cats annually, enabling birds to prosper and survive has certainly become a challenge. At the same time, my interest in birds has become a source of joy for me and hope for their future. Feeding them especially during the winter months has not only provided a vital source of food but has given me hours of discovery, companionship and a way to bind with nature.

Helping birds certainly extends beyond the feeder and there are important steps that we as individuals can do to protect them. To name a few:

- 1. Support legislation that protects birds against the development of wetlands, grasslands, coastal areas and deforestation.
- **2.** Keep cats indoors. Even when well-fed, these non-native predators hunt and kill over two-thirds



of the total birds killed in the US. With approximately over 110 million cats roaming outside, it is important to support legislation and organizations like Friends of Animals that advocate the spaying of feral cats.

- **3.** Plant native plants and watch the birds come in. Native plants provide food for birds, save water and fight climate change.
- **4.** Reduce pesticides and buy organic food. Along with millions of birds killed by pesticides, foods that are considered healthy for us like spinach, kale, strawberries, and apples have also tested extremely high for pesticide residue.
- **5.** Reduce plastics which are especially harmful for sea birds. At least 80 species of sea birds ingest plastic mistaking it for jellyfish or seaweed.
- **6.** Watch birds and share what you see. Get involved in bird counts online like the Great Backyard Bird Count which is done every February.

Birds are essential as pollinators and seed dispensers, consumers of insects, rodents and other small mammals, keeping the populations in check, and ensuring a proper balance in the ecosystem.

So think about caring and sharing in the lives of our fine feathered friends during the New Year. In the process of protecting them, we are actually helping ourselves and the generations that follow us.


