In order to get designation, we had to name it as a sister organization----Greater Wayne Charitable Fund. This is spelled out more thoroughly in later pages. It simply means that individual contributions, companymatching contributions of your present or past employers and contributions by companies or granting institutions are tax-exempt by the Internal Revenue Service. If you itemize your deductions, this is a benefit to you. That is certainly a benefit to corporations and granting agencies. The USE of money is exactly the same; it is used for scholarships and perhaps other educational programs in the future.

Nothing changes at this branch level in the use of contributions from you.

This issue, as always, is packed with information on upcoming activities and events, interest groups, and issues. We sincerely hope you enjoy all of it and that you will put some of these on your calendar.

What can I say about November? I'll say: this is a very important election on all levels (Federal, State, Local). Please vote---no matter your party, your candidates, your issues. YOUR VOTE COUNTS!

It's been a century since the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was introduced, and despite some progress, women's equality is still at risk due to fluctuating legislative decisions. Without the ERA in the U.S. Constitution, advances in women's rights that we took for granted are at risk of being weakened or even reversed. Waiting a century for over half of the U.S. population to attain constitutional equality is long enough. Tell Congress, not one more year!

The U.S. Department of Education finalized the longawaited updates to Title IX. Now, we need Congress to know that people support this strong and robust Title IX rule that will protect students experiencing sexual harassment, strengthen supports for pregnant and parenting students, and includes LGBTQ+ students.

In the five decades since its enactment, Title IX has opened doors for girls and women from classrooms to playing fields. But despite tremendous progress, challenges to equity in education still exist. That's why we need the Gender Equity in Education Act (GEEA) to ensure schools and educational institutions have the resources they need to comply with civil rights law.

Women hold two-thirds of the country's \$1.7 trillion student debt. As a nation, we rely on women to add to and strengthen our economy. That can't happen under mountains of student debt. Ask your members of Congress to support legislation that would make college more affordable for all students and help millions of borrowers across the country pay off their student debt.

All children should have equal opportunity to succeed. Yet, millions of students are in schools with school-based law enforcement but without essential support such as counselors, nurses, school psychologists, or social workers. Urge your members of Congress to invest in keeping all kids safe at school and support students to ensure their educational success.

It is that time of year when local farmers are harvesting their crops and bringing them to their roadside stands and farmers' markets. Besides the joy of strolling the stands and browsing the produce, this pleasantry serves as a benefit not only to ourselves but also to the local economy and environment.

With respect to the advantages to ourselves, locally grown food is picked at the peak of its ripeness, many times 24 hours before it makes its way to the shelf. It's full of flavor versus being harvested early in order to be shipped thousands of miles and distributed to local markets. Just think of the produce that was grown in Peru and its journey to your table! Think of those strawberries and tomatoes that may look ripe, but upon your cutting board they are colorless and flavorless!

Also, local crops are safer and more nutritious. The more steps there are between you and the food source the more chances of contamination and preservative sprays that keep lettuces and vegetables fresh in their cellophane bag. The number of recalls for produce are growing rapidly and it stands to reason just thinking about the process. The expiration date on the package and date when the produce was picked, washed, sprayed, packaged, shipped and finally brought to distribution centers makes you leery about the

every dollar spent at the supermarket. The corporations are the ones who enjoy the profits with the shareholders; whereas, the farmer can sustain his business and therefore support your community.



Also, buying local food is good for the environment by creating less pollution and lowering our carbon footprint. We do not need to travel as far, nor does the food travel far to its market. The transportation of big corporate produce travels hundreds, if not thousands of miles polluting the environment with carbon emissions. Another factor is the packaging! Local produce is sold without packaging. Shoppers bring their own reusable bags and all this equates to less waste and less plastic. Hence, the local farmer provides green space and a healthy ecosystem for your community. Their sustainable practices boost biodiversity and protect pollinators. They save the landscape from the ravages of blacktop.

Finally, what could be nicer than chatting with the grower, asking him/her about ideas for preparation, new recipes for a staple, or information about trying a new vegetable? Can the shelf stocker at

> your local chain store give you the same information? That direct connection is a valuable and personal learning experience!

> Shopping local might seem like a small step to a healthier self, community, and environment, but if it caught on, it could make a large impact on our lives and our planet!

Buying local food also supports the farmer. The money that is spent with local farmers and growers all stays close to home and is reinvested with services, businesses, and employment in your local community. The local farmer receives 80 cents of every dollar spent at the stand; whereas, the big growers receive 20 cents for
