Best to all until our next interactions.



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New Jersey lawmakers are moving to place limits on who can request books to be removed from libraries. Dozens of people testified, including students who

said protections are needed in school libraries. The Freedom To Read Act (S2421) introduced by State Senator Andrew Zwicker (D– Princeton) and State Senate Majority Leader Teresa Ruiz (D-Essex) establishes



requirements for library material in public school libraries and public libraries and protects school library media specialists and librarians from harassment. The bill cleared the Senate Education Committee after passing the full Assembly in June.

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Bill S2310, which requires transparency concerning compensation for promotional opportunities and in employment listings, passed in both the Senate and Assembly with bipartisan support. Read more about it in AAUW NJ's press release.

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New Jersey's law to provide free accessible menstrual products in public school bathrooms went into effect this September. However, ensuring compliance with the law often rests with students and the public. We encourage members to check if their local school districts are following the law. If they are, do take photos and send them to aauwnj@gmail.com. If not, contact your local school administrators and ask them to check with the New Jersey Department of Education to learn what they need to do in order to be compliant.

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A new year of AAUW activity is underway! To reach gender equity, we must look to our mission of STEM education as a path for girls to achieve in science, technology, engineering and math careers. AAUW has


successful programs to foster that path, and we encourage each branch throughout the State to incorporate an annual STEM activity. This year we hope to increase branch and camper engagement and funding for the camp. Here are several suggestions for how you can participate:

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offer a one-day program to girls in local schools,
Tween Tech for middle-school students and
Teen Tech for high-school students

sends girls from counties throughout New Jersey to a week-long summer camp at Stockton University.

To meet this goal, importantly, members are encouraged to: Help increase the number of campers to pre-pandemic levels (60 girls) by contacting middle-school science teachers in your area to make them aware of the program and to nominate students.

# Are You a Sustainable Shopper?

With the cold weather approaching and the holidays around the corner, I thought I might share some thoughts about shopping, concentrating on clothing. Hopefully it may encourage you to check out the clothing you've bought and be mindful of gifts you buy, considering their effect on the environment and enable you to make the best possible shopping decisions in the future.



I have generally been critical of online shopping especially buying from mega corporations like Amazon, who tend to gobble up smaller businesses and eliminate the competition. However, I decided to put my personal feelings aside and get an objective view on whether an online or in-store approach is more eco-friendly when it comes to shopping.

What I found was that most studies favored online shopping over in-store shopping with the exception of people who have access to public transportation to shop and/or those who live in walkable cities where it is convenient to walk to shop. It is important to note, however, that buying a number of items at the same time either while online or in a store also helps reduce the carbon footprint in both types of shopping.

But then there are the returns... The truth is that online goods are approximately 3 times more likely to be returned than items bought in brick and mortar stores. It also turns out that returns not only cause a headache for retailers but also create a giant carbon footprint. Most companies simply do not have the technology in place to handle return goods, so it is generally more beneficial for them to sell to discounted retailers or even truck them to a landfill.

The average American buys about 53 clothing items a year, about 4 times more than in the year 2000 with over 11.3 million tons of textiles winding up in U.S. landfills each year. With a booming world population expected to grow from 7 billion to 9.7 billion by 2050, solutions that ensure that our

returns can be recycled, reused, or donated are vital.

The fashion industry is responsible for a whopping 20% of global wastewater pollution. In addition, washing synthetic fibers releases microplastics into the ocean which can harm marine life and contaminate drinking water. Fabrics commonly used by the fashion

industry, such as nylon, acrylic, and polyester, are made from petroleum through a complex chemical process that turns polymers into long, flexible plastic chains. As a result, they are not biodegradable, but they are durable, cheap, and trendy and often are used only a few times before being thrown away.

So what can we do when we need a dress for a special occasion? For a sustainable choice, you might want to choose to rent rather than buy a dress—and yes, they even have websites specializing in renting dresses for women over 50. And let's not forget about thrifting—where you can find second-hand clothing that has stood the test of time, is inexpensive, and lessens the impact of new clothing production and the environmental damage it carries.

Hopefully you are concerned about your carbon footprint but probably have "skeletons in your closet" like I do. So, you are now wondering how you handle the synthetic clothes you already have? Not to worry—you don't have to toss them out— the better alternative is to continue wearing them until they wear out and wash them when absolutely necessary. The only route to a sustainable future is to phase out synthetics, limit your fabric choices to plant-based products, such as organic cotton, linen, hemp, lyocell, and bamboo, and buy only what you need and NOT what you want.

Since Halloween is over, it just might be the right time to replace the "skeletons in our closets" with a more sustainable outlook for the upcoming year. I hope so.

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
