Whenever I talk about reaching out, I need to thank all of you for your monetary and non-monetary contributions to this branch and therefore to our cause of supporting education of women. You have been generous in 2024, and we continue to need your help in 2025. Thank you.

Speaking of 2024, however, our track record is more than that designation. We have held events for the membership and public, educational sessions like the abbreviated CPR course and the computer/ smartphone technical support session, and our interest groups have been very, very active (these ohso-very important interest group meetings are a real opportunity for us to support each other in fun, learning, and wellness environments and lifesupporting camaraderie.) Arna Taraporevala has given us a wonderful recap for 2024, and you can see it in this copy of The Advance. Plans for 2025 are exciting. We will always have our major initiative of supporting women going back to school to finish up this step in their education, and we will be giving scholarships this year, as we have done for more than 60 years. You can meet those winners at our scholarship dinner in May 2025. But we have christened a second education initiative; we are providing 3 scholarships to high school students. These are for female high school students who are pursuing college educations in STEM (science, technology, engineering). It is totally funded for 2025. See details in this copy of The Advance.

This event aims to provide a public information session on Affordable Housing (usually called Mt. Laurel housing). This is a huge issue for many of our municipalities. 

I always face a bit of uncertainty with each new year. What will 2025 hold for me, my family, my community, and, most of all, my country? Besides my health, my life is pretty much in my control; my family not so much, but for now and the foreseeable future, things look positive. In my community, I can volunteer and participate to make life aesthetically better and socially warming. However, when it comes to our country, I canvassed and voted, and that is pretty much where my control ends.

The news and social media are full of dire warnings or hopeful promises depending on where you listen, read, or watch. That divided hope or hopelessness, depending on which side of the divide you find yourself, can be stressful. Whether you are anticipating brighter days or dreading doom, the idea that some are jubilant and others are up at night imagining the worst is cause enough to ask, "Have I missed the point"? The result is self doubt.

To the hopeful, you are most likely approaching 2025 with anticipation. You look forward to relief from the stressors of your life to be answered with the choices and direction of the next administration. However, for those on the other side of the divide, the fear mounts with every news broadcast and every social media post. However, to those on either side, I offer some suggestions.

First and foremost, one cannot believe everything we hear. (Isn't that a sad statement, but an inevitable truth for the present!) Promises and dreams of others are sometimes broken. As citizens relying on our country's history, it has been proven that our Republic will prevail. It has survived the division of the Civil War, the McCarthy era, the social upheaval of the Vietnam war and race riots in the 60s, and countless other challenges. Democracy is never neat; at best, it's messy, and our three-pronged checks and balances of our representative government should give cause for reasonable hopefulness.

Also, spending more time improving your life and the lives of others is helpful. It creates a positive feeling of accomplishment. It's something that one has control over, and it curbs the desire to check out



what's happening in our 24-hour news cycle! One hour on an objective broadcast once a day is probably what most of us need to stay informed. Leave all the commentary and echo chambers behind.

But most of all, think of yourself as part of a greater community of citizens who voted their conscience, be it for better or for worse. This certainly helps with the sentiment of "the divide." All have survived. Every election cycle has winners and losers. That is the beauty of a democracy. We have tried it all, and officials have tweaked their policies from the response of the voters, be it by our ballots or our letters to respective representatives. Remember, the disappointed from the last cycle made it through four years, and the disappointed of this cycle will make it through the next four years (or perhaps the next two years). We vote, we hope, we continue to learn that the campaign rhetoric of each party is intended to instill fear, and to give in to that fear is to be manipulated. Having trust in our democracy and its long history can give us peace of mind. It is our decision. We have control of how we live our daily lives with trust in ourselves, in our community, and in our government to do the right thing, eventually.

Why it matters: The department plays a critical role in protecting civil rights, providing financial aid, and supporting students with the greatest needs. Its elimination would jeopardize funding for low-income schools, special education programs, and make higher education a riskier bet for students.
