
LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

AAUW ACTION UPDATES

<u>Tell the EAC: Reject disinformation-driven</u> <u>voter suppression</u>

America First Legal Foundation has petitioned the U.S. Election Assistance Commission (EAC) to add documentary proof of citizenship to the federal voter registration form — an intentional tactic opponents of voting rights are deploying nationwide.

Sound familiar? Congress advanced a similar idea in the House-passed Safeguarding American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act, which is now pending in the Senate; this petition tries to force the same result through regulation.

Here's the truth: Voters already affirm citizenship when they register. Adding paperwork hurdles would block eligible voters — especially students, women, people of color, rural and low-income communities — simply for lacking a passport or other documents.

The comment period has passed but keep up with the latest developments by reaching out to advocacy@aauw.org. Use this email to get information about AAUW's advocacy work, which includes topics like gender equity, educational access, and economic security.

Media inquiries: The email can be used for questions related to media outreach or AAUW's messaging on specific issues.

Event support: You can email this address to request materials for advocacy events or to inform the organization about your upcoming activities.

Action network: For specific, time-sensitive actions, you can sign up for the Two-Minute Activist program, which sends alerts about current issues and helps you contact your representatives.

AAUW was at the Supreme Court (Oct 15)

CEO Gloria L. Blackwell stood with our members and partners as the Court heard a redistricting case that could weaken the Voting Rights Act. Listen to live oral arguments on the AAUW website. The case was widely reported on in the press.

Diving Deeper for Rare Earth Minerals: Assessing the Risks

The subject of mining for rare earth minerals (REM)s is a hot news topic. Besides being discussed at our last Current Events session on Ukraine, I decided to dive even further into the subject by expanding my search to deep-sea mining of REMs and sharing that with you.

The extraction of rare earth minerals (REMs) has become a prominent topic due to their essential role in modern technologies, including consumer electronics, electric vehicles, renewable energy, medical devices, and defense systems.

However, the environmental risks associated with deep-sea mining are significant and warrant careful consideration.

Despite advances in ocean exploration, much of the deep sea remains unknown compared with our current knowledge of outer space. Recent expeditions have revealed unique ecosystems, such as the Mariana snailfish at 27,000 feet and a vast colony of ice fish in Antarctica. These discoveries highlight the biodiversity and fragility of deep ocean habitats.

REM mining is particularly destructive because these minerals are dispersed throughout the earth's crust, making extraction challenging, expensive, and environmentally hazardous. The use of harsh chemicals in processing further exacerbates environmental harm. Deep-sea mining disrupts habitats that have developed over millions of years, destroys sponge and coral communities, and generates sediment plumes that impact filter feeders and photosynthetic organisms.

Additionally, noise and light pollution from mining operations can disorient marine species and disrupt migration and communication patterns. The long-term consequences remain uncertain due to limited knowledge of deep-sea environments.

As interest in deep-sea mining grows, scientists



advocate for stricter regulations and comprehensive impact assessments to prevent irreversible damage. The High Seas Treaty is one attempt to protect marine biodiversity in international waters, establishing a legal framework for marine protected areas and conservation measures. As of now, 75 countries have ratified the treaty, with 60 required for it to enter into force by early 2026. Notably, China, India, and Japan have signed but not ratified the treaty, while the United States has neither signed nor ratified it.

To safeguard ocean ecosystems, it is crucial to adopt sustainable alternatives, such as recycling rare earth materials from electronic waste and investing in innovative technologies to reduce dependency on new mineral extraction. The mining industry must prioritize sustainable practices and responsible resource management to mitigate environmental impacts and promote a more sustainable future.

Easier said than done on our already fragile planet. I think I'll come up for air.




